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## Rector's Corner

For me, one of the most meaningful prayers of the entire church year is the last of the "solemn collects" that we pray on Good Friday:

"O God of unchangeable power and eternal light: Look favorably on your whole Church, that wonderful and sacred mystery; by the effectual working of your providence, carry out in tranquility the plan of salvation; let the whole world see and know that things which were cast down are being raised up, and things which had grown old are being made new, and that all things are being brought to their perfection by him through whom all things were made, your Son Jesus Christ our Lord; who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen."

Christians have been praying this prayer for a very long time. While the exact date of its writing in unknown, it is at least 1200 years old and was probably written at least several centuries prior to that. Indeed, not just this prayer but many of the unique liturgies and rituals that we celebrate during Holy Week are found among the earliest recordings of Christian practice and have accompanied the faithful year after year after year. Participating in them helps us remember, to become one with generation after faithful generation who have worked and struggled to follow Jesus amidst the changes and chances of life.

But as I do that each year, this particular prayer reminds me that our faith is not just, or maybe even not primarily, about remembering or staying the course. This prayer reminds me that God is always doing new things and that our work is to look for signs of God's renewal and re-creation and welcome them, wholeheartedly. Doing that may require giving other things up, things we may have come to love. This is what makes true sacrifice so hard... and so uncommon.

So as we approach and then celebrate Easter together this year, I want to invite you to open your thoughts and prayers and senses to what is changing around you... in your life in general, and especially in your life of faith. Instead of assuming that these changes are in spite of God, what would happen if we assumed that God was somehow at the center of them... and is calling us to find "him" in them... as the radical, incomprehensible, life-altering promise of Easter dawns on us anew, both as individuals and as church.


#### Go to Dark Gethsemane

While planning the services for Holy Week, I was pleased to find out that Fr. Jadon and I share a fondness for the hymn "Go to Dark Gethsemane, #171 in The Hymnal 1982. I have loved this hymn since childhood and always looked forward to singing it during Lent. Then I could not exactly describe why I found the hymn so appealing, except that I remember finding it beautiful in a kind of mesmerizing way. It seemed to just embody Lent.

As a musician, I now appreciate the simplicity of the tune of this hymn. The first and last lines of the tune are almost identical. The middle line of the tune is made up of a short, two-measure phrase that repeats itself. This makes the hymn very easy to learn and sing. Only seven notes make up the entire tune. In keeping with Lent as a time to clear our lives of distractions and to focus more clearly and humbly on the journey of our Lord to the cross, it seems appropriate to have a humble, simple hymn to help us.

The text of "Go to Dark Gethsemane" was written by James Montgomery (1771-1854), who was born in Scotland. He was the son of Moravian parents who died while they were on a mission trip to the West Indies. James was in boarding school when his parents died. He is said to have grown up with "a strong religious bent, a passion for missions, and an indecent mind." These characteristics led him to be briefly imprisoned twice for his work as a newspaper editor who espoused radical causes. Among other things, he protested against slavery, the situation of chimney sweep boys, and lotteries. He published eleven volumes of poetry, mainly his own, and about four hundred hymns. More than one hundred of those are still in use. In describing "Go to Dark Gethsemane," The Hymnal 1982 Companion says: "The hymn meditatively reflects the Moravian observance of Holy Week reading services in which the reading of a harmony of the Passion narrative is interspersed with hymn stanzas and anthems." There is a final stanza (omitted from our hymnal) that brought the meditation to Easter morning.

Early hasten to the tomb, where they laid his breathless clay; All is solitude and gloom; Who hath taken him away? Christ is risen? – He meets our eyes. Savior, teach us so to rise.







### From our Sr. Warden...

As we make our way through Lent and on to the Easter Celebration things continue to be tweaked and changed at St. Paul's. Some are apparent as you see the difference in the services we have become accustomed to. Though similar, they are different and do tend to give a new and fresh look at the way we do church. Rev. Jadon, Organist Julie, and Choir Director Jeff have put in many hours arranging inspiring changes to the music. Whether a large or small change, it is only a change to those of us already here. Newcomers to our church will see what we are doing today and assume this is the way we do business and presto, evolution has happened.

My feeling is that most people do not think of us. They do not see us on Facebook, Google or other places online. We put banners outside the church, not to sell people on our church, but to make them curious enough to look us up. I am asking you all to Google St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Jackson, MI and write a good review. You can do the same on Facebook or LinkedIn or whatever platform you are on. The review they read online may be the first impression they will get of our church and we want it to be positive and current. I believe most people that visit us will like us...maybe enough to return!

## Treasurer's Report

Pledges and Tithes received as of 2/28/23 were \$58,054 compared to \$59,375 at 2/28/22. Thank you to EVERYONE for your gifts and faithfulness to St. Paul's.

Year-to-date expenses are down \$4,680 compared to YTD 2022. Most of the decrease came in payroll, especially the Rector's and Sexton's wages.

Our bank accounts are moving from Comerica to County National Bank (CNB) effective April 1. We will be able to get interest on our checking account that we could not get at Comerica. The ECW's checking account will remain at Flagstar.

A huge thank you to St Paul's for the loving and tangible support for Mama Tu-Tu's Easter outreach. Each year Mama Tu-Tu shares Easter Baskets with more than 200 neighborhood children. The 20 baskets and goodies collected through St Paul's will be assembled and wrapped by our youth group on April 1st for delivery to Mama Tu-Tu. Each basket will also contain a colorful card from St Paul's with the message: "Be You. Be Loved. Belong."

Please mark your calendars! **St Paul's is participating in a Ward 5 Cleanup Day on Saturday May 6**. Ward 5 is our church neighborhood, encompassing Jackson Street to West Ave, and Ganson Street to Glenwood / Harwood / and Morrell Street. Cleanup Day is being organized by a resident of Ward 5, Christy Davis – a working single Mom who also leads a Girl Scouts troop – who has been inspired to reach out and serve her neighbors in tangible ways.

The planning for May 6th so far includes a morning shift and afternoon shift of volunteers who will help individual homeowners and business owners in Ward 5 with anything from picking up trash, raking leaves / weeding / mowing, hauling larger items to a central location for recycling, etc. In the evening a simple dinner of grilled hot dogs / chips / fruit / brownies will be served in 3 different locations around Ward 5 to enable neighbors and workers to fellowship over food. Volunteers to help grill hotdogs and serve food will also be needed. **We will share additional details as they become available**.

Throughout the month of May our congregation will be enthusiastically involved with St Paul's ECW collection of Baby Pantry items for Jackson's "Together We Can Make a Difference" program. Items needed include: Powdered formula (any brand); Size 6 diapers (other

sizes are already provided); wipes; Baby blankets and baby quilts; New or gently used clothing for children under 2 years of age. Let's make a difference for this important and necessary ministry.

# The Women of St. Paul's Episcopal Church

Spring is finally here people!! The crocuses have bloomed and it's a delight to see. We made it through the winter and now warmer and longer days are our future. Bring it on, I say.

April is a busy month on the religious calendar. Our Muslim brothers and sisters continue to celebrate Ramadan, our Jewish friends will celebrate Passover and we Christians look toward to Holy week and Easter Sunday.



Holy week starts with Palm Sunday when Jesus is welcomed by a jubilant crowd waving palms and shouting "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!" Ironically in a few short days these voices will also be crying, "Crucify him!" The week also contains the well-known and widely celebrated, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday. Lesser known is Holy Wednesday or spy Wednesday.

Holy Wednesday is a time that is often observed with the service of Tenebrae – Latin for darkness. Psalms are read along with other readings while candles on a candelabrum or 'Tenebrae hearse', are extinguished slowly symbolizing the growing darkness of the days to come. Something to perhaps meditate on this coming Holy Wednesday.

We were blessed with a visit by Sister Esther Kennedy, a Dominican nun from the Convent in Adrian. Her presentation has been described as refreshing, uplifting and forward thinking. She gave our usual and tired view of the Catholic church a whole new and welcome perspective which was well received by the women of St. Paul's. We look forward to having Sister Esther join us in the future.

As I've mentioned previously, the Baby Pantry drive has been moved to May. The items needed are diapers size 6 ONLY, baby wipes, powdered baby formula, gently used or new baby clothes from newborn to age 2, and baby blankets and quilts. Any items you could supply would be greatly appreciated.

Normally at this time we would be asking for people to step up for the new board which will start in September for the year 2023-2024. At the moment all current board members have agreed to continue in their various roles. We would, however, ask you all to consider where it is you see ECW going in the upcoming year? 


#### **Borehole Wells**
