

Friends,

"I hereby command you: Be strong and courageous; do not be frightened or dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go."

Joshua 1:9

I hope your summer has been glorious and your gardens fruitful! We spoke about fruitfulness in our lives last month giving credit to the Holy Spirit who gives each of us many gifts to share here and in our community. I hope you've taken some time to check in with God about the gifts of the Spirit in your life and what helps or hinders your use of them.

Currently, your vestry and I are trying to negotiate a contract with a caterer to use our kitchen and their services to provide for funeral reception meals, big dinners and help with our occasional meals as well. This is the first time we've done this as a parish and it's a result of changing needs and changes in what we can do ourselves. Sam McCamey, our beloved former sexton, cannot work with us anymore due to continued health problems. He is well cared for but the loss of his presence and work among us is acutely felt. Since coming here two (amazing!) years ago, we have averaged a funeral a month. Not all funerals have meals, but many do, and this has put increasing stress on a shrinking pool of volunteers providing food for these events. It is time to think creatively and work out a solution that expands our ministry possibilities while meeting our needs as well. Please pray for your vestry and me as we work with Big Guy Catering to put together an agreement that solves our problems but also provides for expanding our mission here in downtown Jackson. If we come to an agreement, we will be announcing a parish-wide meeting to discuss the contract and what it means for all of us. Rest assured we are consulting with the property experts at the diocesan offices to make sure we get the details right!

One thing that is extremely hard to get across to people during a time of change is that change is not a repudiation or negation of the past. The infernally partisan rhetoric that swirls around us now makes this hard for us to hear. We've lost the ability to recognize change as a natural and healthy part of life as we grow. My hope is that we can truly honor the past, the leadership and stewardship of so many members over the years, as we recognize our need for change. We must adapt and invest so we can grow our capacity to serve each other and the city of Jackson in the name of Christ. More to come and prayers gratefully taken!

A Hidden Child Remembers the Holocaust.




From Our Jr. Warden

Building & Grounds

July was very warm, watering plants and shrubs as best we can. Many thanks to Harry Strait, Helen and Ed Greene & Susan Smar, for their efforts in keeping our grounds as best as they can be. Plans are pending for our parking lot to be sealed, lines repainted edge of steps painted caution yellow should be during late August. The Kitchen oven is still on the back burner as to replacing it, pending direction given to Buildings & Grounds. Replacement cost at the time of quoting was \$3600.00 plus shipping and installation.

No major plans on the horizon except for Holy Spirit Hall and hallways around it. Christoff's is scheduled to begin stripping and refinishing the floors Monday August 12th through the 16th. Sunday August 11th after coffee hour it will require a team of parishioners to help clear the hall of tables, chairs, pianos and any other items so the floors can be refinished. Please check your schedules so conflicts will not arise due to inability to use HSH and adjoining rooms during the week. Upstairs access for Finance and counters using the hallway adjoining the bathrooms on Monday will be as usual. Entry to the building from the east using the rear doors from the city parking lot will be closed during the week. Entrance to our facility will be through the S. Jackson St. doors. Normal traffic will resume on Saturday August 17th. Again, a team of volunteers will be needed Saturday August 17th at 9 AM to put back tables & chairs for Sunday coffee hour. Please call the church office or Kyle King to make it known you will be there for tear down or set up accordingly.



The Women of St. Paul's Episcopal Church

The year continues to whiz by and we find ourselves in August already. Hope everyone is enjoying their summer and staying cool on those beastly hot days.

ECW had their monthly meeting on July 13 with Dr. Namita Sharma as our speaker. Dr. Sharma is a pediatric hospitalist at Henry Ford Allegiance Health and also a volunteer with Doctors without Borders. This is an independent medical humanitarian organization which was founded in Paris in 1971 as Medecins Sans Fronteres (MSF). It currently boasts a 67,000 mainly volunteer body active in 74 countries.

Dr. Sharma has been to a number of MSF locations including South Sudan, and more recently Ethiopia. She shared a lot of her experiences there with photos showing staff as they set up some of the tent structures, children she had treated, photos of her own accommodations (very basic) and photos of a group of smiling children thanking their caregivers. She told many stories of what people surrounded by conflict have to go through to get the most basic of medical care. There was the story of a woman who wanted her baby born in a safe, hospital setting so she walked for three days to try and reach the MSF clinic. She went into labor before she got there and people in a nearby village helped her to finally reach the clinic where she and her baby were taken care of. A lot of children presenting at the clinic are suffering from malnutrition and she shared the problems and solutions associated with that condition. Vaccinations are also a huge part of the basic treatments offered to clinic families. There was also the little girl who was bitten by a snake as she slept. While the photo was hard to see, but Dr. Sharma assured us she made a full and complete recovery.

Although they operate in conflict zones, MSF does not employ armed security. They have a "no guns" policy. These volunteer medical staff give of their time and their expertise under very stressful situations. Dr. Sharma shared how her tour of duty is made up of 14 hour days with no days off for four months out of the year. She also shared how it would not be possible if her co-workers at HFAH did not help pick up the slack caused by her absence. So although one doctor goes overseas, others also contribute who stay behind. While MSF strives to establish clinics in relatively safe areas, those who

volunteer are very brave to go to these war-torn regions and regardless of their religion are doing God's work every day. Thank you Dr. Sharma, we are very grateful to you for taking the time to talk to us about such an important organization.
