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O Come, O Come
EMMANUEL

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For the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation to all, training us to renounce impiety and worldly passions, and in the present age to live lives that are self-controlled, upright, and godly, while we wait for the blessed hope and the manifestation of the glory of our great God and Savior, Jesus Christ. He it is who gave himself for us that he might redeem us from all iniquity and purify for himself a people of his own who are zealous for good deeds. – **Titus 2:11-14** Friends,

I bet you don't remember the day in the Lectionary each year we read this verse from St. Paul's letter to Titus. It's ok I didn't either! This passage is read each Christmas Eve/Day every year. Paul sums up the Good News of God in Christ that God brings salvation to ALL along with the guidance of the Holy Spirit to help us live lives that manifest the presence of Christ in ourselves and to the world. God saves us and saves others from our sinfulness as well! God doesn't need us to get cleaned up and be presentable to have grace bestowed on us. God meets us here and now in whatever condition we're in and says "Give it all to me and I'll help you look more like my Son. Walk with me and I'll make your life beautiful. Receive my love and I'll help you love your neighbor every day."

This fractured world with all it's ugliness, abuse and power-mad leaders will not stand forever. As we recognize how frail life is God gives us new life in Jesus Christ born in our hearts anew each day. Earthly life is fleeting while new life in Christ is eternal. Are you tired of the sin you see around you? Are you tired of the sin in your own heart? Are you tired of the burden of this life? Lift up your heart, behold the Lord your God, receive His love and watch that love change your life. This Advent we have much to do each day and we are asked to take more time to focus on God's love and Jesus' birth and how they affect our lives. More importantly, how does our faith in Jesus affect our neighbors' lives?

I hope you'll join us in worship and study each week and my online conversations on Art in Advent. The schedule for these Zoom conversations is in this Epistle and the recordings will be posted on Facebook to view later if you can't make it in person. Our worship for Christmas Eve will be online and will be Holy as well. God is not outside our technology but works through Facebook and Zoom and all the other tools we invent. We'll record a service for Christmas Eve/Day that you can watch at your convenience on Facebook and I'll live broadcast a Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve from our chancel for those who want to celebrate the first Eucharist of Christmas at midnight. A small and quiet service for those whose hearts need it. Melissa is coordinating a video version of our Epiphany Pageant to be broadcast on Sun. Jan. 3rd as the beginning of our worship.

Above all, my hope is that our hearts and minds will be so ready for Jesus to be born again in us that we will pant with longing for God's presence and willingly give ourselves to the new life promised to us by faith in Jesus Christ. To Him we give glory, honor and praise! Faithfully,

Curate's Report



Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ. I commend you because you remember me in everything and maintain the traditions just as I handed them on to you. -1 Corinthians 11.1-2.

Advent in the age of a pandemic means a shift in focus to that which we rarely focus on in this time of year: new traditions. While we normally look toward our annual Christmas traditions of all kinds, this year brings with it many challenges to our time-honored church and family traditions. Most adults have already lived through changes that have taken place with families and holiday traditions over time, but for our youngest members, they will be having to change or forego Christmastime traditions they have experienced every year of their lives to date. With that said, we will be keeping many of our St. Paul's Advent traditions. In addition, with old traditions not possible, we can help fill the gap with some new activities that may or may not become family traditions going forward. Families have received Advent bags which will contain an activity for each family to do each week during Advent. One activity will be to act out a portion of the Epiphany pageant. These clips will be compiled to form a virtual pageant this year. This is a gift for the church community to see our families with younger members since we aren't able to gather in person. I can already see the youth looking back saying, "remember that year when we had to act out the Epiphany pageant at home because of the pandemic?!?!" Certainly this Advent and Christmas season will be one to remember and it is my hope we can help to make those memories good ones.

I invite everyone to take part in one of the activities that our families will be doing as part of their Advent bags. This activity is about gratitude. Families will receive paper chain links with encouragement to write things they are thankful for on them. They can be strung together into a chain to be read on or after Christmas. Perhaps this Advent you are called to try this in your home. You could do it with any jar or other container and some small pieces of paper to write the gratitudes on. Place the jar in a prominent place where you will see it, or make a practice to add one item a day. On or after Christmas, go back and reread all the gratitudes you thought it important to remember. This can be done individually or as a group and is one way to focus on the positives despite the challenges of living through the pandemic.

When we think of our Episcopal traditions, we will be doing our best to keep those going, especially when it comes to worship. Those traditions are made to remember Jesus in all we do. No matter where we are, or what we do this Advent, the most important tradition is that we carry Jesus with us. This aspect of tradition will not be set aside. It is what will help us through the challenging season.

Advent is about preparing for Jesus to be born again. Perhaps this year we can understand this in a different, even deeper light than in the past. After all, one reason we come together as a church community is to learn. Learning isn't just for the children and youth. This Advent gives us all an opportunity to see things in new ways if we only open our eyes. May your Advent be a blessed one.

Blessed Advent season to you all. I hope you all had a good Thanksgiving this past Thursday. It was different this year for many of us as we had to forego so many of the traditions of past years because of COVID-19. Hopefully, like us, you managed to make the most of it. We all have so much to be thankful for.

Now we have entered the season of Advent as we await the birth of our Savior, Jesus Christ. How fitting that the light of the world is born at the darkest time of the year. Advent is a season of preparation for the arrival of the baby Jesus. The season represents peace, joy and hope. Last year we were able to start Advent with a Taize service which helped us focus our hearts and minds. We are unable to gather this year however, there are a lot of Taize services available on YouTube and I highly recommend watching one as we move into the Advent season.

Despite the virus ECW has been busy! The nut sale was a hit and we are very grateful for all who ordered this year. We will still have nuts available between now and Christmas and will be selling till our stock runs out. <u>Thirty-Four Years Ago In</u> <u>The Life of St. Paul's</u>

St. Paul's Vestry 1986:

The Vestry met and voted to raise a minimum of \$150,000 for repair and rebuilding of the organ. They raised \$92,000 by April 1987, and in June an anonymous donor contributed \$100,000 to the fund. Sparry Sparks and A.P. Cook headed up this effort.



End of 1987 it was possible to add a majestic "*organ trompette en chamade*" to the renovation project by the Mueller Pipe Organ Company, of Toledo, Ohio. It was installed in the balcony on the west wall above the wooden front doors on the lower level.

Blessing and dedication of the organ was held October 6,1989 as part of the Sesquicentennial Celebration of St. Paul's. World renowned organist Gerre Hancock preformed the Dedicatory Recital. Gerre Edward Hancock (1934-2012) was an American organist, improviser, and composer. He was Professor of Organ and Sacred Music at the University of Texas at Austin.

En chamade (French: "to sound a parley") refers to powerfully voiced reed stops in a pipe organ that have been mounted horizontally, rather than vertically, in the front of the organ case, projecting out into the church or concert hall. They produce a commanding, loud trumpet-like tone, used for fanfares and solos. It is known as trompette en chamade. Any stop mounted *en chamade* will be much louder than a stop elsewhere in the organ, even though in church organs the stops may stand on the same wind-pressure.

I know we are all hoping to hear it used again very soon!

Another Interesting Fact:

While we are on the subject of the organ I would also like to share that in 1952 the wooden grill work in the chancel area was installed to cover the organ pipes at a cost of \$1,000. On February 9, 1956 a family provided one-half the cost, and later another family stepped forward to contribute the second -half. Regretfully, I don't have the families' names at present, just the time-line.


