Friends,

Epiphanytide is a time of growing light, of increasing knowledge of Jesus as the Christ and of the true meaning of discipleship. As we study the scriptures we are given during Epiphany we see an awakening of those around Jesus to who He was and what that meant for their lives. Reacting to His teaching, healing, feeding and loving, men and women left their ordinary lives to follow an extra ordinary man who wanted nothing more than to change the world.

But what about us today? 2000+ years after Jesus' time we sit in beautiful churches in a country where religious and individual freedom are enshrined into law. We live in such comfort compared to Jesus' first disciples and it's hard to see ourselves dropping everything as they did to follow Him. Thankfully, most of us will never have to endure the hardships they did for being disciples of Jesus Christ. But what about our faith? How are we called to live as Christians in this time and place today? How does your faith affect your daily life? My hope for this Epiphanytide is that you'll ask yourself these questions, engage with scripture and pray for God's love to show you the way.

Changing the world means first understanding the reality of our daily lives. Are we living in gratitude? Love? Generosity? Grace? Do people experience us as peacemakers? Do our lives point to Jesus' Way of Love for our partners, families, friends and coworkers? I'm not talking about being that annoying Bible-thumper who rains on everyone's parade. Do people wonder at how you can be so kind, helpful and joyful? Are folks encouraged by being around you? Do folks come to you for a listening ear or helpful advice? If so then you are living a disciple's life maybe without knowing it. If you can connect your faith in Jesus to living a life of loving service, then you will find the sweet spot of discipleship in your life.

Ask God to guide you as you look at your own disciple's life and find the places that need strengthening, places where you need partnership with others, places where you need to celebrate God's gifts in your life. These prayers can serve as a good guide for the season of Epiphany as we encounter Jesus' ministry and think about how it is reflected in our own lives. If we are faithful at these Holy Conversations with God and others we will find ourselves growing as disciples and ready to enter a Holy Lent in March. God's grace and love surround you so "fear not!" and know that God loves you enough to help you change the world right where you are, starting with yourself. Blessings for this Epiphany and may God take you on a grand adventure of growing discipleship.

From Building & Grounds..

Vestry and Fellow parishioners,

Building & Grounds met on January 17th, 2019. Meeting started at 5:30 PM. In attendance were Dennis Marsh, Harry Strait, Michelle Gibson, Nathan Randall, Ed Greene and new member Joe Spotts. We did a year-end wrap up with things left over from 2018 and planned future projects for 2019.

Old business: Remove & replace remaining old exit lights with LED ones with battery backup. Continue replacement of old fluorescent lighting with LED ones.

New business: Due to so much litter ending up on our property B&G will have a listing of members to be responsible to do the pick up by month. Nathan Randall is on for January, Kyle for February, assignments will be given for rest of the year. Gloves and containers will be provided. Any parishioners wanting to help please contact Kyle King at 517-787-1274 or leave Alice (office admin.) a note. Harry Strait has volunteered to check plumbing sinks and traps for proper function. Dennis Marsh has taken on the task of rerouting the boilers exhaust (Wesley St. side) to prevent ice buildup on outside temperature sensor wires. Clean up of B&G areas, Harry Strait has offered his services to begin a "spring cleaning" of specific areas, this will be an ongoing process. Harry was the person that painted the conduit where the new temp. sensor is in the hallway leading up to the balcony, Thank You for a great job Harry. Kitchen grease trap has been serviced. However, people using this sink must be sure no food is on the items to be cleaned. The sprayer over the garbage disposer is where you remove food particles.

Requests have been forwarded to B&G with a concern of the motion light in the Choir Director's "office" inoperable. Request for bookcases moved to the upstairs room next to Finance be secured to the walls. The floor in Holy Spirit Hall and the hallway surrounding it is in dire need of stripping and refinishing. I am preparing a quote for vestry approval to begin the process to maintain the floors due to many years of traffic with no preventative maintenance.

Thru the request of the Safety & Security Committee, we purchased and installed 2 1/2 pound fire extinguishers in several rooms. In the event of a fire in any room, it is essential for an extinguisher to be available to put out the fire, preventing a bigger one. We will arrange soon training for all interested in the proper use of a fire extinguisher. An estimate approved last year (2018) for Safety Systems Inc. to install another remote-controlled unlocking device has not been put in place on the doors leading into the glass narthex from S. Jackson St. Safety Systems (Rob Davis) explained the unit quoted was not compatible to our door resulting in a special order one. I will watch for any difference in the estimate vs. invoice.

Cold weather is upon us. When the temperature is below 10 degrees, we need to keep inside doors open in the church. this includes the fire doors leading from/to church narthex to the glass narthex, the doors from/to Narthex into the Nave, the glass doors leading to hallway in front of the offices. All doors on both sides of the altar to be left open. Our heating units are functioning well however the mini split AC/Heating units can stop working below 10 degrees. The mini splits are the units mounted on the wall in the Sacristy. I have left the sink faucet in the Sacristy on to a slow drip as the water lines are below the floor. You may be bored by now, so I will stop here.

Anything you see that needs attention please let anyone on the B&G team know.

The Parable of the Vineyard (Theme: Generosity)

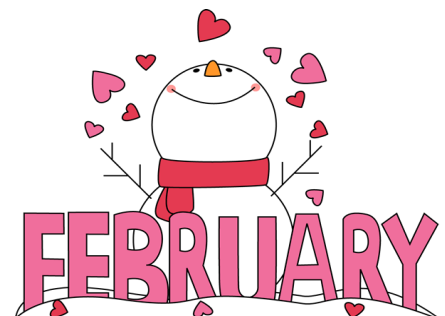
Jesus Turns Water into Wine (Theme: Abundance)

Mary Poppins Returns

So, I was really nervous going to see this film because Mary Poppins is my favorite movie of ALL TIME! I know it by heart, every line, every song and have watched it too many times to count! I was skeptical, at first, that a sequel could possibly work and then I started to read who was involved in it. Frankly, they had me at Lin-Manuel Miranda. Creator of the smash success, Hamilton, Miranda is this generation's Gene Kelley and Rogers and Hammerstein all rolled into one. He acts, sings, dances, writes lyrics and music in two languages! Armeet Hammer plays Martin, a man who was a true partner and mate ahead of his time and the kind of guy you want on your side during a tough fight. Take your tweens and teens to see this movie and then talk with them about how every right we have today was the result of someone fighting for our future and stepping outside the box they had been put in. What an amazing story!

Can be felt.

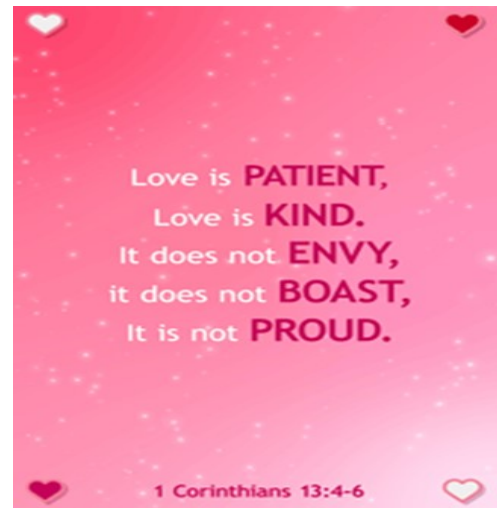

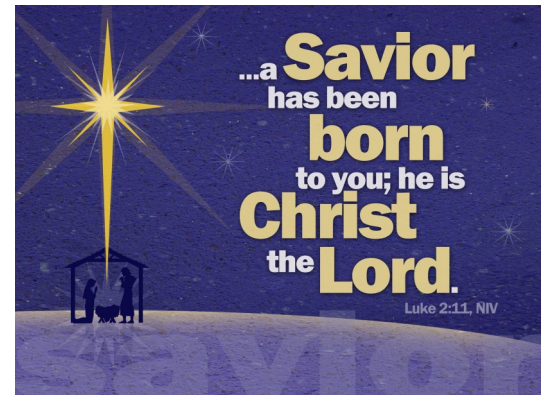


Weekly cardio drumming classes are on Tuesdays from 5:30-6pm in Holy Spirit Hall for St. Paul's parishioners. Come and check it out!
