

Rectors Corner

God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day. - Genesis 1:5

The people stood far off, while Moses drew near to the thick darkness where God was. - Exodus 20:21

Even the darkness is not dark to you; the night is bright as the day, for darkness is as light with you.

- Psalm 139:12

Friends,

We are in a season of growing light. The word Epiphany means reveal. We automatically associate Epiphany with light as Christ's identity is revealed throughout our hearing about His life and ministry. Throughout scripture we use light and dark to mean Good and Evil or God and the Devil. But this binary language neglects the fact that it was God who created the darkness, God who named the darkness and God who dwells in darkness as well as the light.

Our eagerness to classify things and people as good and bad negates the reality that both coexist in each of us and in the world around us. There is nowhere that God cannot be found and no place that Christ will not be with us. Especially in our direst struggles and darkest nights of the soul Christ is with us, holding us. God rules the darkness as much as the light.

We fear the darkness because of what we try to hide there and because of the unknown that dwells there. We would rather try to hide ourselves from each other and God (as if we could!) and keep ourselves ignorant of the darkness of our world to somehow insulate ourselves. This endeavor never works except to isolate us from God and our neighbor and, frankly, our true selves. To never know or wrestle with our own darkness and our own struggles is to live a sort of half-life, bound to our fears instead of living in our realities.

This Lent we will have a chance to study a powerful book written about the brokenness in our own justice system. We will hear of suffering and strength of hopelessness and of triumph. We will marvel at the faith of those who wait for justice and those struggling to gain it in an unjust system. Just Mercy by Bryan Stevenson has recently been made into a movie and I suggest you see it. Even if you can't attend a book study session please read this book. Appropriate for Epiphany, it will reveal much to you about our justice system. Appropriate for Lent, it will help us bear the wound of knowledge together and be inspired to work for justice in our own community.

God made us and knows us better than we ever will. My hope is that as we prepare for the season of Lent and see the light increase around us that we'll gain the courage to look into the void inside of us and enter it with Christ. What frustrates you about yourself? What disappoints you about your relationships? What keeps you from being kind to yourself and others? Are the words you use for yourself loving? Do you find yourself being more critical than uplifting? Do you long to be really and truly known and loved for who you are? Put all these things before the God who made you and knows you and loves you. You are beloved and in knowing that, you will be able to love others.

My prayer for you is that God gives you the courage to love and I ask you to pray the same for me. Faithfully,

"Everyday Minister" With Melissa our Seminarian

Building on my January article about being an *Everyday Minister*-the thought that everyone has the potential to be a minister in their daily life and work-I decided to highlight **Margaret O'Connor** as an everyday minister for February.


In talking with Margaret about her story, I learned that she is the Principle Environmental Planner at Consumers Energy. She explained that she works in the environmental department at Consumers Energy. Her main duties include ensuring that wildlife, most often birds and bats, are considered as energy lines, wind farms, and power demands increase.

When I asked her what her go to scripture verse or prayer was, she told me she often turns to, "With God all things are possible." She further explained that her job includes making sure the wind farms are constructed in the proper places. This means places where there is less impact to bats and birds. And I learned that the wind turbines kill eight times as many bats as birds! Margaret said that "With God all things are possible" comes in very handy when there are competing interests as to the placement of the wind farms. Margaret also shared that another prayer she turns to often is the Serenity Prayer, which she says helps her to remember to be patient. This prayer emphasizes controlling what we can and giving the rest to God. She sometimes keeps this prayer on a coin in her pocket as a reminder.

When I think about Margaret and her Everyday Ministry, I think of this prayer from the Book of Common Prayer (827). "For Knowledge of God's Creation: Almighty God, you made the universe with all its marvelous order, its atoms, worlds, and galaxies, and the infinite complexity of living creatures: Grant that, as we probe the mysteries of your creation, we may come to know you more truly, and more surely fulfill our role in your eternal purpose; in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen*."

Hospitality is alive and well at St. Paul's. Many new people have come through our doors in past Sundays and coffee hour is an excellent time to sit and talk and welcome them to our church. With the help of Jeremiah, our new Kitchen Manager, hosting at coffee hour has become so much easier. This year's month of January has been mostly quiet considering last year. Expenses were minimal largely because of very little snow removal. Repairs to heating systems were kind until yesterday, when the computer running the heating system in the church fondly called the sequencer failed. Our heating system is running in the interim until a comparable unit is found.


Lighting upgrades are continued with the office/administrative area. Several light bulbs not working, need replacing. Bulbs are on order to replace bulbs with LED unit's lasting longer, using less energy used. Work in progress is a coordination of thermostats throughout the facility, more to follow.

Jackson city has begun a conversation with property owners about future increases in utility bills. I attended a 6th Ward meeting Thursday hosted by current counsel person Will Forgrave. The subjects were water bill increases & the leaf pick up program. It sounds like significant increases in the cost to use city water. Details to be determined by the city.

At our January meeting Dot Tetreault, LMSW, gave us a compelling presentation on the effects of social media and "screen time" on young children. The information she presented was truly eye-opening and concerning for parents and grandparents alike. MRI scans show specific areas of the brain lighting up as children use these devices. 


SAVE THE DATE!
