





Christ is born, Alleluia! As I write this letter we are still amid the glory of the 12 days of Christmas. deeper than you can imagine.

# From our Jr. Warden...

My Epistle entry this month will be the last one as I will be stepping down as your Junior Warden and Vestry person. Yes, my three years of service are done. However, I will remain if allowed to be the chairperson of Buildings and Grounds, reporting to the vestry. This will open the Junior Wardens position to a new direction, being more of a "peoples" warden as needed not mandated as B&G chairperson. I want to thank the Buildings and Grounds team working to keep our parish in great shape, Harry Strait, Michelle Gibson, Dennis Marsh, Nathan Randall, Steve Baldwin, Clark Hutchens, Barney Rudolph, our garden specialists Lynn Eckerle, Dr. Edward & Helen Greene, and Susan Smar. I cannot remember a year in recent past that this parish has given SO MUCH to so many.

The Safety and Emergency Planning Team have taken steps towards making our parish a safer place to be. Considering the current situation of crime and violence throughout the world we have installed better and more efficient outside lighting, installed a closed-circuit TV camera system monitoring all outside doors, hallways and sanctuary. Have purchased two-way radios for communicating between Sunday school, nursery, ushers and a team member from the Safety and Emergency Planning Team that will monitor the cameras.

We have accomplished much this year and have a plate of new opportunities for 2019! Completing the changeover of florescent lights to LED bulbs throughout the premises including Holy Spirit Hall. Refinishing the floors in Holy Spirit Hall and the hallways around it and the hallways upstairs in the education building. Refinishing the wooden doors leading in to our church from S. Jackson St. replacing the broken window leading up the steps to the balcony will be replaced.

The safety and emergency planning group are looking at plans for evacuation of the buildings in the event of a fire or another event. This will require a change of thinking such as with old wooden doors with door knobs in the sanctuary will be converted to push bars for quick exits, keeping the original doors in place. Being mindful of not placing items in the path of emergency doors or exits. Conduct drills to become familiar with the procedures of exiting quickly. Purchase rope ladders for the second-floor rooms in the education building. So, we have much to do and always welcome new faces!! Buildings & Grounds meet on the last Thursday (5:30PM) before the vestry meetings and Safety and Emergency Planning will resume on Monday's 5:30PM starting

January 7<sup>th</sup>.





### Pastor Sarah's Picks!



#### Friends,

Some of you know one of my favorite pastimes is going to the movies. I've loved them ever since I was a kid and love losing myself in a delightful story or visual journey. I want to share some of my movie-going experiences with you as a fun column for our 2019 newsletters. I'm in no way an expert or a critic you should follow I just know what I like and have fun talking about movies with others. So here goes, hope you enjoy it and see you at the movies!

#### They Shall Not Grow Old

Famed director Peter Jackson is the only person who could've made this remarkable film. As a child, having heard stories about his grandfather who was a veteran of WW1, Jackson was fascinated by the history of the Great War even making his own 8mm film about it as a young boy. With his wildly successful Lord of the Rings trilogy, he amassed wealth, talent and a great creative empire based in New Zealand. He also collected WW1 memorabilia like uniforms, regimental records, war magazines and even some canons from the period! So when the British Imperial War Museum approached him in 2014 about making a film out of their huge collection of silent film reels from the war and audio recordings of WW1 veterans, Jackson jumped at the chance.

The product of 4 years of hard work (the length of the war itself...) was They Shall Not Grow Old. Creating computer programs as they went, his creative team were able to take the shaky, grainy old films and restore them to the right speed and resolution and even brought in an expert American group to colorize them with realistic beauty of the countryside and the horrors of the battlefield. He brought in expert lip readers to interpret the silent film segments and then hired actors (with accents proper for the regiment who were filmed!) to do the voice overs. He then took the hundreds of hours of audio interviews the BBC had done with WW1 veterans during the 60's and 70's and threaded a narrative of the everyday British soldier's experience in the Great War from the day war was declared to Armistice.

The result is nearly miraculous. Flat, grainy images of grubby soldiers marching at a comical pace become flesh and blood portraits of young men and boys off to war straight from their parents' home, from the farm or factory with no idea what they're about to experience. Jackson, doesn't try to include a little bit of every part of the war, instead he follows a few regiments as they deal with the mud, death and decay of every day on the front. What he produces brings humanity to old images which have been moldering in museum archives for a century. The boys who leave spoiling for a fight come back (if they're lucky enough) men who have experienced the horror and futility of war and understand it's unholy disregard for God's greatest gift. Life...

The movie is in limited release now but will surely come to dvd or an online service later. If you have an interest in military history, are a Peter Jackson fan or just want to see the amazing technology at work in today's film editing world...I recommend seeing They Shall Not Grow Old. You won't be disappointed!


