We believe in prayer that changes us, changes relationships, changes the world. Miracles can and do happen and most often they happen because hearts have been changed. Prayer can be the engine of that change.

I'm Irish and I cannot mention March without mentioning the feast of St. Patrick on March 17. But we also have the feast of St. David who died in 589 A.D. on March 1 which is now his feast day. He is the patron saint of Wales and while the Irish wear shamrock for St. Patrick, the Welch wear their national flower which is the daffodil in honor of David. While talking of saints, we should also mention St. Joseph whose feast day is March 19. St. Joseph was the husband of Mary the mother of Jesus and was also stepfather to Jesus.

March is also Women's History month and there are few women with a richer history than Harriet Tubman whose day is celebrated on March 10, her birthday. Her enslaved parents gave her the name Araminta and she sometimes went by Minty. She is most famous for her work as an underground railroad conductor and "I never ran my train off the track, and I never lost a passenger!"

Closer to home the women of St. Paul's ECW met on February 12 with our speaker being Dr. Cathy Glick, a local cardiologist. Dr. Glick did not disappoint in her presentation nor in the valuable information she supplied. She outlined how women are so different to men and how easily they are misdiagnosed when presenting to ERs with cardiac issues. ## Metaphors for Ministry

For the calendar year of 2022 I have an article series running in the Epistle about *Metaphors for Ministry*. Check back each month for a new metaphor. I'd love to hear your own spin on one of these metaphors.

The metaphor I'm highlighting this month is "*light*." Light is a key concept that comes up often in Christianity and is worth talking about again. The focus of this article is to think about how we can see light as a metaphor for God's love with ourselves as a medium.

One needs not be a great scientist to know that light, when it hits a medium can do several things based on what it is hitting. I like to think of God's love as light sent to us. We then have the choice of what we do with that love. Options of what to do with it are what happens to light when it hits something.

We can **absorb** the light and love God gives to us. We can take it in and bask in it and enjoy it for ourselves remembering just how much God loves us for who we are as an individual. This is an acceptance of God's love.

We can **reflect** the light and love of God meaning we cast it back. Maybe we don't feel like we deserve God's love or maybe we are angry about something which causes us to cast the love back. When this happens, we reject God's love.

We can **refract** the light and love of God meaning we take it in and tilt it in one, slightly different direction. A person who refracts God's love often is very passionate about a single issue, working consistently for change in this area. It would be something one feels strongly about and works for change.

We can **diffract** God's light and love when it hits us. This means this love surrounds us. It's for the worse of times, when we think we may not be able to go on. This is God wrapping God's loving arms around us in a time of need.

And we can **scatter** God's light and love when it hits us. Once God's love hits, we may immediately scatter it far and wide in all directions. One who scatters has the heart of a servant, and is likely a gifted evangelist.

Certainly, we all have experienced each of these aspects of God's love. As we move into Lent, perhaps one discipline we can do is recognize and think about how God's love is impacting us and how we are using it as we live and move and have our being out in the world.

#### A Woman Composer from the Hymnal 1982

Last month, for Black History Month, I wrote about Dr. David Hurd, a very successful African-American organist and composer represented

in our Hymnal 1982. This month, for Women's History Month, I thought I would write about a woman composer with works in our hymnal. While I had discovered Dr. Hurd easily, as part of my study of the composers of the Service Music, finding a female proved much more difficult. I saw no female names when I read through the Index of Composers, Arrangers, and Sources for Service Music. I moved on to the Index of Composers, Arrangers, and Sources for Hymns and was rewarded with barely half a dozen names, most of whom had very little information available about them.



Annabel Morris Buchanan was one of the few women that I was able to read a bit about. She was born in 1888 and was an American folklorist as well as a composer. She worked to promote, document, and preserve the music of the people of the Appalachian Mountains. Annabel was born in Texas, where her mother was a teacher and her father was editor/published of a local newspaper before he became a Presbyterian minister when Annabel was ten. Annabel showed musical talent at an early age


and at age fifteen, she won scholarship to the Landon Conservatory in Texas to study piano, violin, voice, and composition. After graduation, she spent the next six years teaching before marrying John Buchanan, a lawyer. Annabel's time then focused more on her home and family of two sons and two daughters. She still served as an organist/choir director and continued to compose. She was also active in her local chapter of the National Federation of Music Clubs and continued on to serve as a state president and a national board member. (Jackson's own

Tuesday Musicale is part of this organization.) She also wrote articles about gardening for national magazines, like Better Home and Gardens.

IN 1931, Ms. Buchanan founded the White Top Festival, which worked to preserve, disseminate, and educate others about the traditional folk music of Virginia, North Carolina, Kentucky, and Tennessee. A measure of the festival's success was having Eleanor Roosevelt as the guest of honor in 1933. The larger measure of its success is the many folk tunes that are still with us and being performed today as well as being used as hymns, choral pieces, or parts of symphonic works. Annabel published more than 100 original art sons and hymns as well as arrangements for almost 250 folk songs/hymns. She died in 1983.

In our Hymnal 1982, Ms. Buchanan is credited with one arrangement of a folk tune, LAND OF REST, that is used with two different texts (#304 and #620).

#### "HOLY GLASS"

## A Tour of the Windows of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Jackson, MI Part 8

This month we will complete our tour of the windows of St. Paul's. Our last two and most recent windows are R-1, Christ at home with his family, and L-1, the Sacrament of Holy Baptism. Interestingly, due to their location, both of the windows are interrupted by the front portion of our balcony. Both L-1 and R-1 were designed by the Lamb Studios in such a way that the areas of the


windows that are hidden by the balcony contain no content other than colored glass panels and borders. On completing the installation of these last two windows, St. Paul's had successfully accomplished the removal and replacement of all of the early geometric windows in the Nave.


Let's begin with R-1, which depicts Christ as a youth at home with his family. This window was inspired by the scripture in Luke, chapter 2, verses 41-51. These verses tell the story of the journey of the 12 year old Jesus to the temple in Jerusalem with Mary and Joseph. When Mary and Joseph are heading home and realize that Jesus is not with their family, they hurry back to the Temple in Jerusalem and find Jesus sitting among the teachers, listening to them, and asking them questions, "and all who heard him were amazed at his understanding and his answers." When Mary and Joseph do find Jesus, they tell him that they were very worried (Luke 2:51). Jesus asks them, "Why were you searching for me, did you not know that I must be in my Father's House?" The panel in the upper portion of this window reads: "He Went Down With Them To Nazareth And Was Subject To Them." Our window depicts Jesus back at home with Mary, Joseph and his brother, James. The panel at the bottom contains the inscription: "To The Glory of God, In Memory of William J. and Frances E. Corbett".






The L-1 window celebrates the sacrament of Baptism. We see a husband and wife presenting their baby for Holy Baptism. The Priest holds his prayer book and a scallop shell, which is often used in Baptism and is the symbol of St. James. Above the baptismal font, the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove descends upon the child. All of the figures are dressed in contemporary clothing. The inscription in the upper panel reads, "He That Believeth And Is Baptized Shall Be Saved." The inscription in the lower border reads, "To The Glory of God In Memory of Maxwell F. and Helen R. Badgley". The borders contain decorative symbols and the cherub logo of the Lamb Studios. If you look closely at all the windows designed by the Lamb Studios, you will see that their cherub logo changes stylistically over the years.

Go to the land I will show you...

I'll be honest, I have a love/hate relationship with the First (Old) Testament. On the one hand, there are passages of barbarism, arcane bits of legalism, and downright confusing interactions with the Almighty. On the other hand, the sweeping arc of God's redeeming love for Abraham's family brings me comfort in our own barbaric, confusing times.

As the Randall family has dealt with multiple traumas on the little corner of the world we call Stone Meadow Farm, we have often wondered



what the sweeping arc of God's plan for us might be. The cruelty killing of our beloved family dog on Thanksgiving 2020 and the tornado that took down more than 50 trees in August 2021 irrevocably damaged the sanctuary of the land we bought from Nathan's grandmother. Though we built our house believing we would retire here, we felt as uprooted as the trees we see daily around our home.

In January we began to ask God where we should go. We looked around Jackson for a place we could continue to enjoy country living but stay within the orbit of our family, both biological and chosen. (Here's looking at you, St. Paul's!)

Our search yielded no consolation, however. And as we added Macrae to the list of family members with Seasonal Affective Disorder, we realized that like Abraham, God was calling us to "Leave your homeland and kin and go to the land I will show you' (Acts 7:3)." As we widened our search we discovered the community of Asheville, North Carolina and everything started falling into place.

This area's temperate climate meets the needs of my body's sensitive ecosystem and fulfills a long -held desire of mine to once-again live among the mountains. The schools provide ample opportunities to fulfill Macrae's STEM propensities and Kayla's passion for all things creative. Nathan can continue in his current employment while enjoying the natural beauty of the area and the cultural beauty of the active coffee and brewery scene. Finally, I can expand my spiritual direction practice in a location known for valuing spiritual connection and sensitivity.

At the end of March we will travel to North Carolina to visit the Cathedral of All Souls, acquaint ourselves with the neighborhoods, and hike the Appalachias. When we return we will prepare our house for sale and look for interim housing so we can use our equity to purchase a home in a highly competitive Asheville market. Our tentative plan, God willing, is to finish the school year in Jackson and move in July.

This discernment has been both heartbreaking and freeing, as all good transitions are. We are glad we have so many family and friends in the area so our return visits may be joy-filled and frequent. Our St. Paul's family has been a source of constant support over the last six years, and I don't know how we could have made it to this point without you! Please join us in praying for this transition and celebrating our inheritance of love as Abraham's children and co-heirs with Christ!
