
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## Rectors Corner

*And the God of all grace, who called you to his eternal glory in Christ, after you have suffered a little while, will himself restore you and make you strong, firm and steadfast." 1 Peter 5:10*

Friends,

Alleluia, Christ is Risen! The Lord is Risen indeed, Alleluia! By God's good grace we each got up this morning in a safe house, warm bed and had food in the pantry to eat. Right there is plenty for us to be thankful for today! Each of us can add a myriad of things to this gratitude list and we should each day. The joy we seek in our lives is a product of gratitude, not the other way around. I say at the end of our worship, "Life is short..." and that's not meant as a downer but as a frame to help us focus our days to the most important things. The length of our days is not guaranteed and the life of our days is mostly up to us. Each of us bears our own burdens, some we share and others remain hidden. None of these burdens can steal true joy if we remain grateful. I've spoken with several our parish family who are enduring suffering and trial and the secret to their endurance is gratitude. Not one of them finished our conversations without a litany of joys in their lives and thanksgivings they name. Their gratitude along side of their suffering is what makes up their testimony. Now, Episcopalians don't use the word testimony in church that often because it's more typically found in other traditions. However, each of us has a testimony. A testimony is a story we tell. It's our story. In court we tell it to a judge, but as Christians we tell it to God. Now usually our testimony is shared with others like friends and family. But at its heart, a testimony is our love letter to God for bringing us through rough times, forgiving us our sins, helping us forgive others and freeing us from the physical, mental and emotional cages we live in. It makes me wonder...what is your testimony?

During the great 50 days of Easter we hear the testimony of several of the disciples and learn how they became apostles sent out to spread the Good News throughout the land. The Good News they told was of Jesus' life, death and resurrection but it was told through their own testimony of their experience with Him. What is your experience with Jesus? None of us now has seen Him face to face but surely we've experienced the love of Christ in the life of someone dear to us or in the worship we give together. During Eastertide I ask you to ponder your own testimony and if you can't articulate one, ask God to help. Spend time in God's loving presence and read the testimonies we encounter in our Sunday lectionary. What is familiar about them? What feeling do these stories leave you with? Can you find yourself feeling the same joy as they did? My prayer is that the exercise of praying about your testimony will help you write it. God has a story of love of which we are all a part. What will your chapter sound like?

# Building & Grounds

## Late winter early spring update:

We faired well through winter with Daugherty's snow removal services. Dwayne's team was very attentive to our needs. Ice melt usage was down from the winter before.

Unsigthly plumbing fitting next to dishwasher in kitchen has been replaced, it was seeping and needed to be replaced.

New cleaning service has been doing a great job looking after our facility, window washing, getting into nooks and crannies. Have heard good things.

We have had a few issues with pests recently, not having anyone under contract since Cardinal Solutions which was many years ago. We now have contracted with Orkin to provide monthly service maintaining our expectations of a clean environment and keeping us in compliance with kitchens codes. Being we are having more events and usage of our facilities the refuse service has been upgraded to a dumpster again. The two 90-gallon containers have worked well. However, at times we have had refuse piled on the ground next to the 90-gallon containers, so the change was made.

On Easter Sunday a ceiling leak was discovered in the Girls bathroom (2<sup>nd</sup> floor) it was determined to be a roof leak. Last Friday it was inspected for repairs and will be estimated as to the cost to repair.

The floors of Holy Spirit Hall and hallways around it will be stripped and resealed after the May 11<sup>th</sup> SOAR event. It will require one ENTIRE WEEK to accomplish this. Any events planned during the month of May need to be examined to accommodate this much needed maintenance. During the scheduled week of the floors being done it will be LIMITED USE, THE FLOORS CANNOT BE WALKED UPON. Must schedule this in the next week for some time before or after Memorial Holiday weekend.

A major water leak was identified by Dennis Marsh on the Monday prior to Holy Week. One of the hydrants supplying water to the garden blew off the wall outside Reverend Sarah's office into the Memorial Garden. Metal fatigue was to blame. Aladdin, our contracted maintenance provider, terminated the faulty fixture. We have one still available to supply water to the garden area. Troy's Lawn Service has begun the lawn mowing season this past week. Susan Smar our gardener has been in attendance and will continue her efforts in keeping our facility weed free this year. Thank You Susan!!

Door locks changed: The doors to Holy Sprit Hall, the doors inside the hall, and the door inside the small dining room for the electrical panel access have been changed to separate keys. Why? Because as we have experienced with increased usage of our facility by groups outside our parish, we have had to request the return of the "master" key they have had. This has been a request of the Safety /Security Team to limit the access of our facility to non-parishioners to just the rooms they need to use.

# Emergency & Safety Committee

Emergency and Safety Team:

We need volunteers from the 26 people that attended the event provided by Michigan State Police Trooper Fletcher, and the

parish at large. What is specifically needed is a group of parishioners willing to be eyes and ears. This means adhering to a schedule of when on duty, SORT OF LIKE AN USHER DUTY, use a radio and reporting as to what you see. We have a closed-circuit camera system other churches would envy. Maintenance & improvements EMERGENCY EXIT : Steve Baldwin and Kyle installed a new emergency exit handle on the door leading out to the MEMORIAL GARDEN next to the Baptismal font. IN THE EVENT OF AN EMERGENCY Parishioners can exit the building through this door instead of the back of the church.

GLASS NARTHEX DOORS LEADING ONTO South Jackson St. now have a door lock as does the back door to the parking lot. See Kyle for explanation.

Sunday services: Outside doors will be locked shortly after services begin, to make it smooth for late arrivals press the intercom button to announce your arrival and security team will buzz you in.

AED: Yes, we have an Automatic Emergency Defibrillator (AED) located between the bathrooms across from the Nursery. A new more visible sign will be placed for ease of seeing in an emergency. We welcome all persons to inquire if interested to learn about the use of the AED. Please contact Michelle Gibson for details.

# The Women of St. Paul's Episcopal Church

## ECW

The year is marching right along, and the May Epistle is here already. It won't be long until summer is upon us and the year will be half over. But before we get that far we have some ECW updates for you all.

Our last full meeting of ECW was held on April 13, 2019. Our speaker was Connie Fridd, who spoke on the opioid crisis. While this is a national crisis, Connie was able to put a more local face to it. Most of us tend to think the opioid crisis is one that is confined to the bigger cities in the United States like Chicago, New York or Los Angeles. Connie is out to change that misconception. She wants to show that people addicted to opioids are not your stereotypical junkie who come from bad backgrounds or childhoods and end up using drugs to dull their emotional pain. Connie shared her story with us and it was a very difficult but important story to hear.

She told us of her son and how loved and wanted he was. How he came from a normal loving home. How he was a very normal child and teen. How he stumbled into opioid use due to a painful injury. How that lead to running with a bad crowd. How the pull of the addiction was so much stronger than the pull of his family. How no matter what she did she couldn't cure his addiction. How his family tried to get him treatment. How they tried to help him without enabling him. How none of their efforts were enough. How the opioids were stronger than their love for him. How they couldn't save him. How the police came to their door for the final time. How he had overdosed. How it finally killed him. His name was Nicholas Fridd. He was a son, a brother, a grandson, a cousin, a friend, a partner and a father. It was a harrowing story but it brought it all to our doorstep and made it more real than the nightly news ever could. Connie's mission now is to put a familiar face to this insidious epidemic and she certainly succeeded with us. Great presentation!

In other news, there are still tickets available for the SOAR Café fundraising luncheon on May 11. It promises to be a wonderful event and people are encouraged to jump on these last few tickets while they last. ECW has supported it so far by selling tables, donating purses and selling individual tickets. We have also donated \$1,000 to off-set the cost of the food and help increase the profit margin. The luncheon takes the place of our regular ECW meeting and there will be no business discussion.

At our June meeting we will be discussing the questionnaire that was filled out earlier in the year.
