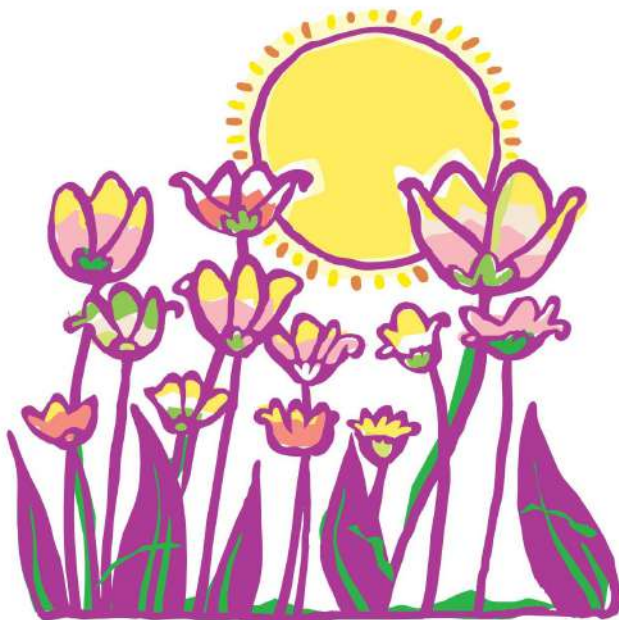

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Rector's Corner

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice." Philippians 4:4

Friends,

I've preached on the curious command to love that we are given by Jesus. We think we need to have warm and fuzzy feelings for someone in order to love them. The Lord says otherwise, and encourages us to love especially when the recipient is hard to love. We are also encouraged to rejoice in the Lord. Paul writes to the Philippians about the need to rejoice even in times of stress and uncertainty. By the act of rejoicing in the Lord we put our cares and worries into God's hands, acknowledging that nothing is too big for God. Philippians 4:4 is followed by well-known verses which talk about not being anxious and giving your requests to the Lord with thanksgiving in your heart. Verse 7 follows this with: "and the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." What these verses state is that when we rejoice in the Lord, we begin to feel peace in our situations, peace in our hearts and minds, because we understand that God has our prayer requests well in hand and brings us peace until those requests are answered. Just like the command to love, the command to rejoice isn't easy but it is essential for our emotional and spiritual well-being. We must acknowledge that God is in control and give ourselves and all our worries to the One who lovingly created us and this vexing world.

I am rejoicing in the healing of my knee and the skilled hands of my orthopedist and physical therapists. I rejoice in your prayers and well wishes. I rejoice in our fabulous staff who are doing such a good job in my absence. My knee is coming along nicely and I'm excited to be back among you for our Bishop's visit.

I also rejoice in the time we have had with Rev. Melissa first as our seminarian then deacon and now curate. She has grown, learned and led with us and I'm grateful to have had her as a trusted colleague over the last few years. No curate comes to stay and Rev. Melissa has discerned a call with St. Katherine's in Williamston to be their part time priest in charge. She has great skills and compassion to bring to this fine congregation. We will miss her but we know she goes with the leading of the Lord and will be supported in her new ministry.

As we build our future here at St. Paul's, we will have important conversations about the leadership of our children and youth ministries and God will lead us forward together. Please keep this vital ministry in your prayers as we build for the future of St. Paul's.

Finally, we have ever more burdens laid upon us by the state of our world and our own country. Our prayers must be accompanied by praise of our Lord so we remember that we pray not into an impersonal void but to a God who knows and loves us and will help us find our way. As we continue to wrestle with abortion in our personal and civic lives I want you to know what the Episcopal Church has said and continues to say about this vastly important topic. Your opinion is yours and your church honors that and you. A summary statement of this legislation is:

The Episcopal Church teaches that “all human life is sacred. Hence, it is sacred from its inception until death. The Church takes seriously its obligation to help form the consciences of its members concerning this sacredness. ...

In a series of statements over the past decades, the Church has declared that “we emphatically oppose abortion as a means of birth control, family planning, sex selection, or any reason of mere convenience.” At the same time, since 1967, The Episcopal Church has maintained its “unequivocal opposition to any legislation on the part of the national or state governments which would abridge or deny the right of individuals to reach informed decisions [about the termination of pregnancy] and to act upon them.”

The Church urges dioceses and congregations “to give necessary aid and support to all pregnant women.” General Convention “commends the work and mission of pregnancy care centers which stress unconditional love and acceptance, for women and their unborn children.” ...

At the General Convention in 2018, The Episcopal Church called for “women’s reproductive health and reproductive health procedures to be treated as all other medical procedures.” The Convention declared “that equitable access to women’s health care, including women’s reproductive health care, is an integral part of a woman’s struggle to assert her dignity and worth as a human being.”

We continue to advocate that “legislating abortions will not address the root of the problem. We therefore express our deep conviction that any proposed legislation on the part of national or state governments regarding abortions must take special care to see that the individual conscience is respected, and that the responsibility of individuals to reach informed decisions in this matter is acknowledged and honored as the position of this Church.”

From our Jr. Warden...

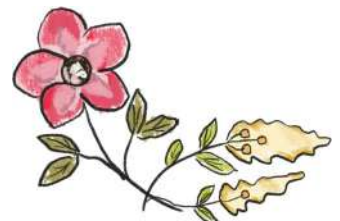

Curate's Report

Siblings in Christ,

Easter season is upon us and with that it feels like we are on the verge of a new normal, at least for the short term. With spring in the air, at least on some days, and seeing well over 100 people in church on Easter I can't help but think of all the good possibilities on the horizon. The faith we cultivated over the Lent season now feels like it is transformed to hope.

We have recently gone back to having the Eucharist in both parts in the service. It was a special Easter surprise for some that the wine was back. We've also been able to add back in bringing up the elements for the celebration of the Eucharist from the back as has been tradition, as well as passing the offering plate. The acolytes have been able to resume their job as servers, assisting the priest preparing and cleaning up the table as well as ringing the Sanctus bells during the Eucharistic prayer. Our worship is looking and feeling more like it did before much of society came to a halt and our worship went to being online based. What a road it has been!

While our folks doing worship related ministries are getting their sea legs back with the new updates to worship, we also have several children and youth taking up new responsibilities as of late. You will see lots of our children and youth doing new roles as they have matured and are taking on new responsibilities. Everyone has shown me a lot of grace as I have been learning the ropes of priestly ministry here at St. Paul's, so I am confident that grace will extend to all those serving as we bring back old roles and new people take on different roles. And now is as good a time as ever to take on a new ministry if you are interested.

Recently we did an intergenerational bible study that was quite a success. Children grades 4 and up joined the adult forum for a five-week bible study related to some of the music and themes from the Broadway musical Hamilton. The lessons provided a lot of time for sharing with different perspectives coming from different age groups.

The children and youth did a service project making cards for the sick and homebound. The ECW helped make the cards as well and the project was spearheaded by our church school teacher Kim Perlos. Over 30 cards were made! The cards went to Arbor Manor and will go to some of our very own parishioners.

The children and youth also gathered with friends from Jackson First Presbyterian Church and Jackson First United Methodist church for a movie night. About 25 kids attended and we watched the movie Prince of Egypt and talked about how this related to what was happening in our current church season.

The annual Easter egg hunt was a hit for our youngest members although some of our middle age group of kids are growing out of this and wanting to take on more teen friendly activities. This is in line with them preparing for Confirmation at the end of the next program year. Seeing them grow and blossom and learn new skills is a joy. I am thankful for the help of Kim Perlos and Peggy Wilds for preparing the Easter eggs and for all those who donated small toys and candy for Easter for the children and youth. Peggy has also been a dedicated behind the scenes bulletin board angel this program year, preparing beautiful bulletin boards for our changing church seasons. When you see her, please take a moment to thank her for this ministry. She takes care of the bulletin board on the corner of the hallway that leads to Holy Spirit Hall which currently features...ALLELUIA!

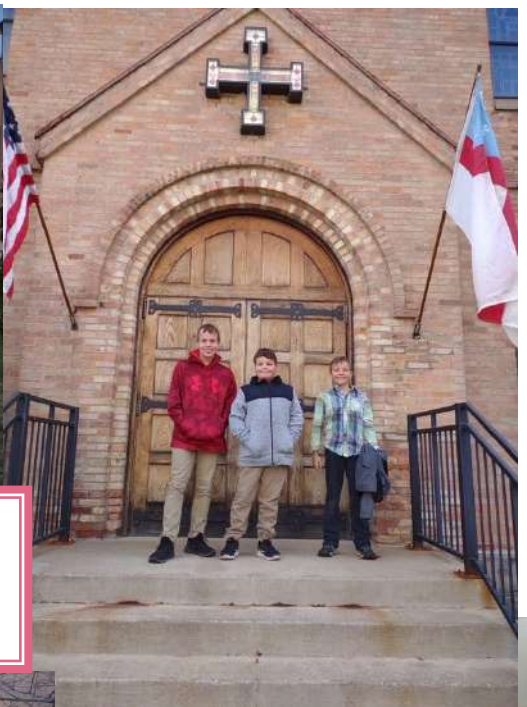
On this Mother's Day, we give thanks to God for the divine gift of motherhood in all its diverse forms:

May is replete with observations and the celebration of many saints. We have May Day of course, celebrating spring in the northern hemisphere. There is also the all-important Mother's Day when mothers all over the country are remembered and celebrated. Some of the saints remembered are St. Joseph the worker, Our Lady of Fatima, Saints Philip and James and St Pancreas among many others. It is also the month we remember nurses, police, teachers, and pets – all of whom get their own week. Whew! There is a lot going on in May. Not to be forgotten is Memorial Day when we remember the men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice for our freedom. It also reminds us to remember our own loved ones gone before us.

ECW went to the SOAR house on April 2 last. It was an amazing experience. SOAR was founded to help women who are in prison and have been trafficked in the past. This life often leads to addiction to blot out the pain from the terrible experiences these women go through. The founder, Michelle Cochran, gave a wonderful presentation on what the organization does to help these women recover and become productive members of society. Michelle has been hampered in her efforts by the pandemic and the regulations set in place in prisons and jails. They currently have two residents one of whom is scheduled to graduation this month. This graduate has so far been a huge success and is scheduled to go on to MSU to complete her bachelor's degree. Her hope is to become a social worker and help other women like herself. Their main fund-raising dinner is scheduled for May 6 at 5:30 at Cascades Manor House. Cost is \$35. This is a very worthwhile organization and worth supporting.

As part of our support of Together We Can Make a Difference, we will be collecting for their Baby Pantry. We are asking for donations of diapers in sizes 4,5 or 6 (no smaller), powdered formula, gently used or new baby clothes, and baby wipes. Any support you can offer will be greatly appreciated and brought to the pantry for distribution to the needy mothers. Make a difference in the life of a mother and baby by donation what you can.

On the subject of support, our nut sale is over! We cannot thank you all enough for your support of this vital annual fund-raiser. It allows us to donate to organizations like Priceless Gifts, Habitat for Humanity and SOAR. Our final profit is \$1,067.60. We went over the magic thousand and we are very pleased with that. Thank you all again!! We couldn't do what we do without you.

We are still in desperate need of a secretary for ECW. It is just for the meetings and NOT for writing the Epistle article. Please search your conscience and your heart and consider stepping up to this position thus easing the burden of the current board. Thank you!!

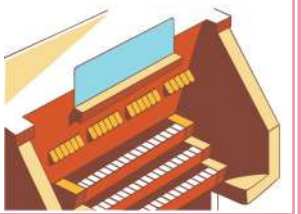

Mother's Day

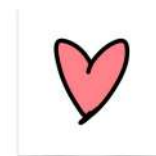

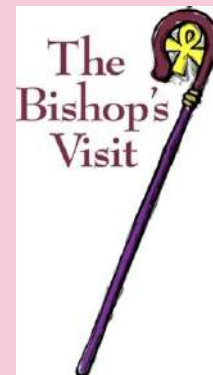
