



Friends,

Fall is here and I am grateful for the change in season. As our Governor has lifted some restrictions on indoor gatherings, so too our Bishop is following suit. We will be open for public worship at the 10:30am service on Sunday, Oct. 11th! You are asked to wear a mask and sit where the ushers tell you to keep us safe. We will continue to broadcast this service on Facebook live each Sunday for those who desire to remain safely at home. Our 9am worship will be held in Holy Spirit Hall for our non-tech parishioners. Using separate spaces allows for careful sanitization after each service. We cannot yet provide a coffee hour or in person Christian Education, but I do hope you'll join us on Zoom for Adult Forum and Bible Study and on Facebook live for Compline. A calendar and links to these offerings can be found on our stpauljxmi.org website.

Melissa has jumped into leadership with our families with young kids as shepherd for children's Christian Ed. Confirmation for youth will continue as well as fun youth activities. Even though we will not be able to offer our Halloween Trunk or Treat this year we will have a special worship for the Feast of All Saints on Nov. 1st and ask you to send in the names of your recently deceased loved ones so we can include them in our prayers on that day. We are beginning to plan for Advent, Christmas and Epiphany so don't lose hope of marking these Holy days with your church family!

In October we ask you to prayerfully consider your pledge to St. Paul's and will gather pledges together in November. We hope you'll pledge if you are not already or increase your pledge as you are able. There is much that we cannot predict about the coming months, but we can recognize the good that is done with the financial blessings we share here at St. Paul's. God blesses so many in Jackson through your contributions and enables us now more than ever to reach out with the love of Christ to our neighbors near and far. Thank you for your continued support of our vital role in Jackson!

Finally, this month we count down the days until the big election in November. We must pray for our country and all who call America home. There is a special resource offered by the Episcopal Church on how to talk across political boundaries. This curriculum will be posted in our weekly email and linked to our website. This week in conjunction with Governor Whitmer's order changing the guidelines for indoor gatherings, we received an update to our COVID-19 directive from the Episcopal Diocese of Michigan and Bishop Perry. Effective Sunday, October 11th:

"Congregations may hold in person worship and gatherings that do not exceed more than 25% of building capacity, or the maximum number of persons while maintaining 6 feet of distancing between households, whichever is fewer."

- Having spoken with staff and our wardens, we are ready to open the 10:30 am service on Oct. 11th for public worship. We will be limited to 50 people and general protocols for COVID-19 safety will be in place. These include: social distancing, contact tracing in the event of a positive COVID-19 diagnosis, and masks for all attending any church activities. Singing continues to be one of the riskier behaviors when it comes to spreading the virus, so we will be following the EDOMI directive which advises against it. We will worship together with no Sunday School or Coffee Hour.
- As of this Sunday, October 4th, our 9am worship will move from the Memorial Garden to Holy Spirit Hall. The space allows for warmth, distance and safety for our non-tech parishioners.
- Our 10:30 am service will continue to be offered on Facebook Live as a safe alternative for those who feel safer worshiping from home.

Even today, my King and Bella comfort me in times of fear and high anxiety. They don't judge me, or talk politics, or speak negative words about others. They show me unconditional love and only ask for my love and attention to keep them safe and secure in return. Even if you don't have a pet, you can still find peace in watching the animals in nature...birds, squirrels...even an o 'possum running across the yard.

Pray for all animals, especially those who are sick and for those who have crossed the rainbow bridge. Take a moment and hug your pet, watch the antics of nature's critters and enjoy the blessings of the animals around you.

Dear Friends,

PURCHASE OF A BELL FOR ST. PAUL'S CHURCH

These Vestry Minutes are located at the Ella Sharp Museum...

Rev. Grinnell, the Rector, had fixed upon Tuesday, January 11, 1853 as the time for Consecrating the New Church; so the purchase was a little after that.

At a meeting of the Vestry of St. Paul's held at the office of Samuel Higby, <u>March 29, 1853</u>. Present: Messrs Sumner, Hayden, Anthony, Stanton, Burr & Higby. The Rector being absent Mr. Sumner, being one of the Wardens, presided.

On motion, it was Resolved that Mr. Henry A. Hayden be authorized to purchase for the vestry, a bell for the new church edifice, if he can do so on terms satisfactory to himself, not to exceed a weight 1,500 pounds.


At a meeting of the Vestry of St. Paul's held at the offices of the Secretary, <u>May 23, 1853</u>. Present: Messrs Hayden, Penny, Stanton, Sumner, Higby & Anthony.

The Finance Committee made a report in reference to the purchase of a bell. On motion, it was Resolved that said Committee be instructed to purchase of the Messrs Meneely Sons, the bell reported as of the weight of 1,232 pounds and to pay \$200 down - the balance in six months with interest.

Resolved also that a subscription be circulated to raise the necessary funds for the purchase of the bell. Resolutions were adopted and the Vestry adjourned.

This bell was a special purchase for our present-day brick church. So when you next hear it ring, please know that it has stood the test of time and what that purchase has meant for all our fellow parishioners . . .

"The Call to Come to Worship!"



Messrs Meneely Sons – the sons of Andrew Meneely – When Andrew died, on August 14, 1851 in Troy NY, the bell casting business continued with his sons, Edwin, already a partner, and George joining with his brother. They were located in Watervliet, New York. The bells were loaded onto barges and ships on the Hudson River near the foundry and were sent around the world.

Results from September Epistle Choir Photo!

Our own, Diane Lawrence, reported that she is one of the young girls in our youth choir picture. She is the girl at the back of the three girls, standing closet to the right-hand-side of the photo. (Diane Kay Baker was Baptized at St. Paul's 1946 and Confirmed in 1958, the daughter of Philip R. & Mary (Cheney) Baker.) Thanks Diane!

Another Interesting Archive Fact -

In the Spring of 1981, The Rev. Debbie Semon was the first women to be sole celebrant of the Eucharist at St. Paul's. She worked part-time as an assistant of the rector because of gifts from ECU, St. Nicholas Guild and Chancel Guild. During that same time period Jacqueline 'Jackie' Blake became one of the first female Lay Readers.

Pledging FAQ's

Your commitment in response to God's blessings makes our worship, community life, and outreach possible. We hope these "frequently asked questions" will be helpful to you as you consider your pledge.

What is a pledge?

A pledge is your commitment to make a financial gift that supports the mission of St. Paul's. Pledging is a response to God's abundance in our lives. It is both a statement of thanksgiving and a lived decision to give others as God gives to us.

Why do we need annual pledges?

Your pledge supports everything we do – from paying the salaries of our staff to supporting our outreach ministries, our pastoral care, our worship, our education programs, and our music. In order to know what we can do each year, we need pledge commitments to develop an annual budget.

Can't we just rely on our endowment?

We do have an endowment generously left to us by previous generations of St. Paul's parishioners. It would quickly disappear, however, if we relied on it as our primary source of parish support.

How much should I pledge?

At St. Paul's, every pledge, no matter what amount, makes a valued contribution to our mission and ministry. We ask each parishioner to prayerfully consider making a pledge that is both responsible and significant based on their financial situation.

Our standard of giving should reflect our standard of living. A tithe (10% of your income) has long been held as the standard of each Christian giving. For most it is a goal to be reached through incremental increases each year. To calculate your pledge or tithe, the following chart may help:

When and how should I pledge?

Pledges are welcome throughout the year, but we would prefer to receive them before December 1st so we can plan for next year. You can make a pledge by bringing pledge card to church, by mailing it in, or by contacting a staff person or member of the Vestry.

Do I have to pay when I pledge? Can I pay in installments?

A pledge is a promise to pay. You may fulfill your pledge with as many or few payments as you wish. Pledges are to be fulfilled on a calendar year basis, beginning January 1.

Can I pay by a gift of stock, a donor-designated fund, or through other means? We welcome all kinds of pledge payments. You may pay by a gift of stock or financial securities, or through a donor-designated fund. To find out how, contact **Marco Shehab**.

What happens if I can't give as much as I pledged?

While it's a commitment to your church and your fellow parishioners, God's grace abounds. If your circumstances change, let the church know that you need to change your pledge. If you've received unexpected additional income, you are always welcome to increase your pledge.

Who knows how much I pledge?

We hold all pledge amounts in the strictest confidence.


