I am happy to announce to those unaware, that we have signed an agreement with the Reverend Jadon Hartsuff as our Interim Minister. He will officially start on November 1. Many of the older members will remember Rev. Jadon as the grandson of Ray Hartsuff, and a frequent attendee at St. Paul's. He is a well-traveled individual with a great resume, and warm personality whom I am sure can guide us through the process of calling a new priest. This an exciting and sometimes frustrating process that we have gone through successfully before.

Which brings me to the other great news for those not at Church on September 25. As part of that process, we have Commissioned a Search Committee. The beginning was full of uncertainty about who will do the service, how do we find an interim, who will serve on the search committee, how do we keep the energy flowing? God has provided the answers to all those questions and given more than we asked. It's good to see not only new faces most weeks but old faces returning. There is a buzz here that will continue to attract new people with new ideas and new energy. That is why I have been looking forward to this report.

Your search committee had their first meeting with The Rev. Ellen Ekevag, Sunday, October 2nd. We reviewed the "Introduction to the Search Process" again and spent time learning about our first official duties as your search committee. Over the next few weeks, this team will be working with Holy Cow Consulting to sign the congregation up for the Church Assessment Tool (CAT), organizing opportunities to take the CAT, and organizing communication to you.

What is the CAT? It is an anonymous assessment instrument that will help us to:

- Pinpoint the strengths of our congregation's culture
- Discover where members would like to go in the future
- Uncover potential resources we may be missing, and
- Prepare us for the search for our next Rector.

The Rev. Ellen Ekevag and The Rev. Susie Shaefer will help us interpret the results and provide us with important insight into what is most important to St. Paul's.

Please know that it is very important that you share your thoughts about our church in this survey. And because of how important it is, we will be working to make sure that this is available through various avenues such as digital/online, paper format, and even provide one to one opportunities for members to work with a member of the search committee to complete and have your voice heard. This assessment is for those who attend church physically often or not, those who attend church online, those who live in Jackson and those who join us from other parts of the country. We want to hear from young and those who are young at heart. We want to hear everyone's voice so please look for more information to come.

October 4 is the day we celebrate St. Francis of Assisi. Known as the patron saint of animals St. Francis also had a great affinity for the poor and devoted his life to one of poverty and helping the poor. He is also known to have founded a convent called the Poor Clares or as they were later known, the little sisters of the poor. It was said that St. Francis lived a life closer to that of Jesus than anyone else in history.

October 1 is the feast of St. Teresa of Lisieux or St. Teresa the little flower. From a young age she was sure she would become a saint. Her path to sainthood was to "do small things with great love." It was her great belief that love was the way to God. Anglican Hymns at the Queen's Funeral

As we witnessed the passing of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, Defender of the Faith, I have been thinking about the connection between the Anglican and Episcopal churches. While celebrating her life, what particularly interested me were her funeral services at Westminster Abbey and at St. George's Chapel in Windsor. I so appreciated the music at the services and was pleased to recognize the hymns as ones that have become more familiar to me since studying the Hymnal 1982 while working at St. Paul's. The two hymns from the Windsor service were especially touching.

"All my hope on God is founded" has a text that was translated from a 1600's German hymn. The poetry of the text is beautiful, but could be difficult to sing if not read in advance.

The first verse has this text:

All my hope on God is founded; He doth still my trust renew, Me through change and chance he guideth, only good and only true. God unknown, He alone calls my heart to be His own.


I would invite you to read the other verses of this hymn, #665 in the Hymnal 1982. The music is one of Herbert Howells's most engaging tunes. He recalls writing the entire melody at the break-fast table after receiving the request for it. It is noted for its "profound lyric beauty and harmonic richness" and was named *Michael* after Dr. Howells's son who died in childhood.

The second hymn from the Windsor service was "Christ is made the sure foundation" #518 in the Hymnal 1982. This text, translated from a Latin hymn text that dates back to as early as the sixth century, has become a favorite since being matched with a tune by Henry Purcell. Many Americans first heard this hymn at the broadcast wedding ceremony of Princess Margaret and Lord Snowden in 1960. The first verse of this hymn is:

Christ is made the sure foundation, Christ the head and cornerstone, Chosen of the Lord and precious, binding all the church in one; Holy Zion's help forever and her confidence alone.

The poetry of all the verses is worth reading and meditating on, but does show the age of John Mason Neale's 19th century translation. The tune name, *Westminster Abbey*, reflects Purcell's long association with the Abbey. He was a copyist and organ tuner from 1674-1678, and organist from 1679-1695, when he died and was buried in the Abbey. He was buried in the north aisle of the choir, where the organ stood at the time, so he is often said to be buried "under the organ."

Jackson Interfaith Shelter; "Helping People Move Forward"

Heidi Lathrop, Dana Burkey, Joe Lathrop and Barney Rudolph had the pleasure of meeting with Steve Castle, CEO, Jackson Interfaith Shelter. We toured the facility as Steve highlighted the impressive list of recent renovations! The welcome enhancements included (but not limited to!) new air conditioning, an updated dining facility, a "resource room" with computers and Internet access, a new playground, and the complete renovation of both the exterior and interior entrances. The renovations made a significant difference in the "look and feel" of the facility. Steve's goal was to create a warm, safe and inviting environment that enhanced the dignity for any individual in need. He was certainly successful!

We discussed many of the facility statistics and areas in which St. Paul's could continue our support towards the shelter needs. There are approximately 35 volunteers currently supporting the shelter. The facility serves an average of 700 people, with over 15,000 nights of lodging and 59,000 meals a year. The facility population includes children. Transportation is provided to-and-from local schools. A local employer, Martinrea Industries, located in Manchester, actively interviews, hires, and provides transportation for working individuals! The coordination and wholesome care of every shelter resident was impressive! Throughout the month of September, St. Paul's provided much needed sustenance, to include: 12 large containers of Quaker Oatmeal, 15 large boxes of cereal, six large containers of coffee grounds and 4 5lb bags of sugar.

Thank you to everyone who generously participated in supporting such a critical need!

St. Paul's Mission and Outreach: Momma Tutu

Our September "Noisy Offering" provided much needed help for Momma Tutu and her neighborhood constituents!! What a pleasure it was to meet her! She is such a warm, thoughtful and spirit-filled individual! We arrived at her home and were promptly welcomed with outreached arms and a hearty "Amen"! Per our request, Momma outlined her current needs. As a result, through the generous donations of our "noisy offering", we provided the following: Clothing: 30 pair girls underwear, 31 pair boys underwear, 25 pair girls socks, 40 pair boys socks. Momma's appreciation for our support was evident as she wrapped us in a heart-felt hug.

Our ability to help our neighbors certainly demonstrated one of my favorite biblical translations of Mathew 25:40: "And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of my brothers, you did it to me'.

"I am continuously amazed at the amount of students that have to fend for themselves every day...whether that's asking for a place to sleep every night or cooking for themselves and all of their siblings or trying to eat without any appliances."
