





Christian education for K-12 at St. Paul's will be in person from 9:15-10:15AM on Sundays, starting **September 19**<sup>th</sup>.




## **Wedding Fever!**



#### "HOLY GLASS"

### A Tour of the Windows of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Jackson, MI Part 4

This month we will be focusing on one window known as the "War Memorial Window." It is located on the north wall of the Chapel. The window is a beautiful memorial to the eight men from St. Paul's-Jackson who lost their lives in World War II. It was created by the Payne Spears Studio and installed at St. Paul's after World War II.



We see Christ standing in the center of the window holding a crown. Three angels – the angel of Peace (top right), the angel of resurrection (middle left), and the angel of Sacrifice (lower right) appear in the window. The design, color and content of this window are exceptionally complex and beautiful. Rich reds, greens, blues, and golds are woven throughout the composition. The calligraphy is equally stunning – using various fonts that lead the viewer's eye to the verse: "I have fought the good fight, I have finished my course, henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness which the Lord shall give me" (2nd Timothy 4:7-8 KJV).

The lower panel of the window contains likenesses of five of the eight men who perished in World War II in prayer. Below them are the names of the eight men who perished.

In the center of the bottom panel we find a portion of the poem "High Flight" by the pilot John Gillespie Magee, Jr., Royal Canadian Air Force:

"OH! I HAVE SLIPPED THE SURLY BONDS OF EARTH AND DANCED THE SKIES ON LAUGHTER—SILVERED WINGS. HIGH IN THE SUNLIT SILENCE, HOV'RING THERE I'VE CHASED THE SHOUTING WIND ALONG, AND FLUNG MY EAGER CRAFT THROUGH FOOTLESS HALLS OF AIR AND WHILE WITH SILENT LIFTING MIND I'VE TROD THE HIGH UNTRESPASSED SANCTITY OF SPACE PUT OUT MY HAND AND TOUCHED THE FACE OF GOD" (edited)

The War Memorial window reminds us that we are mortal, life is a gift and how much we need God's guidance and grace.

P.S. The Wickwire and Carter families took the proceeds from their son's insurance policies and started the Jackson Community Foundation, which continues to serve education, charities and community agencies to this day.





### A Bit of Our Organ's History

In March of 1926, St. Paul's had an organ with 23 stops (sets of pipes), but only 11 of those played. That organ had been installed 31 years earlier, so a decision was made to purchase a new organ. There was a Music Committee that evaluated a number of different organ builders and decided on the E. M. Skinner Co. That organ served the church well until 1958.

The 1960 Organ Dedication program gives me this information: "The work of redesigning and rebuilding the organ at St. Paul's was assigned in the spring of 1958 to Guido Nenninger of Munich, Germany, the second largest organ builder in Germany." The organ became twice it's

1926 size, now having 3838 pipes (2700 of those were new). Most of the ranks of pipes from the 1926 Skinner organ were preserved, reused and revoiced to fit the tonal design of the Skinner/Nenninger organ. Much work was done to improve the acoustics in the organ chamber to allow the pipes to speak more clearly. The Skinner/Nenninger organ had four manuals (keyboards) and a pedal board, as opposed to the three manuals that we now have. There was also an echo organ located in the balcony but played from the console downstairs. This organ was dedicated on February 18, 1960 with a recital by Jack Zimmerman, who was the church organist at the time.

By 1987, St. Paul's was again ready to improve and update the organ. At this time, our current organ company, Muller Pipe Organ Co. of Toledo, Ohio, was awarded a contract for the work after six different organ builders were evaluated. Again, much of the original E. M. Skinner organ was reused but many of the Nenninger additions were not retained due to ongoing deterioration. This current version of the organ was dedicated on October 8, 1989. A very generous donation from the Herrick Foundation assisted with the costs of this construction. I was amazed to find that Gerre Hancock, the long-time organists of St. Thomas Church in New York City, came to

Jackson to conduct a choral workshop in the afternoon and the dedicatory recital in the evening. (I was privileged to hear Mr. Hancock, a renowned improviser, at an organ workshop that I attended as a youth.) In the dedicatory recital program, it states that at the end of the recital, "Mr. Hancock will be given the names of three hymns, all of them familiar to the general public, and will literally compose a new song, using bits and pieces of music from each of the three hymns." Music of Franck, Bruhns, Bach, and Reger made up the first part of the recital.

I hope that you have enjoyed learning a bit of our organ's amazing history as much as I have!






